We aimed high last July, we wanted to accomplish so much, and we developed action plans and strategies to Lead The Way to a better world through continuity, sustainability and co-operation with like-minded organisations. In 1989, RI President Royce Abbey presented us with his 12-point challenge which is still just as relevant today – how has your Club measured up?

- Create opportunities for every member to participate in projects.
- Update the format and content of meetings.
- Conduct information meetings once a quarter.
- Set a target of 10% membership growth.
- Recruit younger members.
- Commence and complete a major project using the entire Club membership.
- Set an attendance goal of 25% of Club membership at the District Conference.
- Promote participation in the programs of The Rotary Foundation.
- Help increase the number of Foundation Benefactors by establishing an endowment committee.
- Develop a community youth activities program and revitalise Rotaract.
- Review Club activities every four months and adjust your plans to overcome weaknesses.
- Develop a leadership program to encourage Rotarians to accept offices and service opportunities in the Club and District.

So during these remaining days of our Rotary year, let us take courage from what we have achieved, but let us also put on that last minute burst of speed and complete as many of our goals as we possibly can – we can still make a difference.

April started disastrously for our friends in the Solomon Islands and the next two weeks were taken up with marshalling our resources to address the urgent needs and putting in place the fundraising necessary to finance rebuilding projects in the future. Once again ShelterBox were quick to come to our aid with 200 shipped into the Western Province where their Response

team supervised their distribution. Offers of assistance poured in from other Australian Districts and around the world and we send our heartfelt thanks to the Rotary world – it makes us so proud to be Rotarians! Congratulations to the Rotary Club of Mitchelton who celebrated their 40th Anniversary on 10 April in fine style – a most enjoyable evening of fun and fellowship involving many past members. Then it was on to our **World of Opportunity** Conference – the feedback has been overwhelmingly positive and we thank Conference Chairman Graham Jenkins, his Team, the host Clubs, and the local community for making it happen. It was certainly a weekend to remember for the 460+ registrants – and I notice that many of Robyn Moore's quotes are appearing in Club Bulletins – laughter gives you access to the seconds of life and ... to BEING human. On Monday 16 April, I bade farewell to the GSE Team from D3300, Malaysia, at a barbeque hosted by Brisbane Mid-City and attended by many of their hosts. This Team has endeared themselves to all who had the good fortune to get to know them and were a credit to their District and Country. They opened our eyes to the beauty and economic opportunities of their Country and I feel certain that they will be receiving many visitors in the months and years ahead as a result. Hopefully we can arrange a Rotary Friendship Exchange soon so that we can expand on the good relations created by the two Teams.

**Rotary International
Service Above Self Award**

Summary

The RI Board of Directors created this award to recognise those Rotarians who truly embody Rotary's motto of "Service Above Self." The purpose of this award is to recognise individual Rotarians who have demonstrated exemplary humanitarian service, in any form and at any level, with an emphasis on personal volunteer efforts and active involvement in helping others through Rotary. **This is Rotary International's highest honour for individual Rotarians.** A maximum of 150 recipients may be selected each year.

Eligible nominees

Rotarians in good standing may be nominated, except the following: District Governors, immediate past District Governors, District Governors-elect, Foundation Trustees, Foundation Trustee-designate, past Foundation Trustee (within two years of having held that position), RI Directors, past RI Directors (within two years of having held that position), and RI Directors-elect. An individual may not nominate him/herself for the award and an individual may only receive the award once. Nominees' service rendered through Rotary must have been on a continuing basis.

Selection process

Only current and immediate past District Governors, and current and past RI Directors are eligible to nominate candidates for this award. The RI Board of Directors will review all nominations. Nominations must be received on the official nomination form.

Western Provinces, Solomon Island Tsunami appeal

Currently SI, NZ and Aus NGO's are working together to undertake cleanup and care to the injured. The most urgent needs are shelter, sanitation, clean water and cooking utensils.

Food is also being provided from as far away as China.

D9600 has undertaken the role of co-ordinating the Australian Rotary effort including transport of equipment to the Western Provinces area.

To date we have received in Brisbane 200 ShelterBoxes, 400 Aqua boxes, 30 Solar Water Purifiers, and 50 Camp ovens.

The ShelterBoxes are on site being delivered to needy remote communities by canoe. Two ShelterBox personnel are on site co-ordinating that effort.

A further 200 ShelterBoxes are on the way to Brisbane. We are waiting on advice from the field on the need for these Boxes on site or whether they should go into stock for the next need. The Aqua boxes, water purifiers and cooking equipment are in containers ready for shipment using our DIK resources.

ROMAC patients into Northern Region April-June 2007

We currently have **K'Chin** (nearly 18 years old) returning Vietnamese boy for further procedures at Royal Children's Hospital. After nearly 3 1/2 years he went home to Vietnam last February. He is being looked after in D9600, host club Hamilton.

Baby **Armando Soares**, from Timor Leste, 11 week old boy suffering a life threatening Diaphragmatic Hernia, arrived after extensive logistical support from many Rotary/ROMAC personnel and medical people in Timor, Darwin and Brisbane via Mater Private Children's Hospital, UN and QANTAS – 19th April. His mother Francisca and he are being looked after in D9600, host club Aspley.

On Friday 27th April we had 9 year old **Phuong Bui**, arrive from Vietnam with her mother Dong. She will receive a further procedure to her nasal cleft at Mater Private Children's Hospital and will be looked after in D9640, host club Gold Coast West.

On Saturday 28th April we received the 2 **Rasmiddin sisters** from Banda Aceh, Indonesia along with their mother and father. These two girls have severe burns scars on their hands, feet and face. They will be looked after by Assoc. Prof Roy Kimble at the Royal Children's Hospital Burns Unit. District 9600 is once again looking after these patients with host club, Brisbane Mid-City.

We still have several more children to arrive during this Rotary year both into our Region as well as others. Our final number for the year will be close to 13 in the Region and in excess of 40 for all Regions, including New Zealand.

It is at this time that we seek support of Clubs in your District, when they are considering distribution of Project Funds prior to year end, by assisting this great programme of all Rotary Districts in Australia and New Zealand ROMAC. When you can, would you please assist by mentioning ROMAC?

POMONA STATE SCHOOL LEADS THE WAY

Pomona State School is one of the first schools in Australia to complete the first stage of the Australian Rotary Health Research Fund's **KidsMatter** programme.

Cooroy Rotary Club President Carol Johnston presented the ARHRF KidsMatter Plaque to the school's student leaders Abby Vartan and Jason Dodwell at the school's assembly on April 23.

KidsMatter is a primary school mental health promotion, prevention and early intervention initiative developed in collaboration with the Australian Government Department of Health and Ageing, *beyondblue: the national depression initiative*, the Australian Psychological Society, the Australian Principals Associations

Growth of the ARHRF



Thanks to the hard work and generosity of Rotarians Australia-wide, the Australian Rotary Health Research Fund is expanding the number of carefully selected projects and scholarships it funds at an outstanding pace.

The ARHRF Funding Partners program is becoming increasingly popular and to meet demand the Board has more than doubled the amount of money available for these projects. Under this program, Rotary Clubs or individuals have the opportunity to facilitate research into an area that is of special concern to them and ARHRF will match the funds donated by the club or individual. In 2007, ARHRF has allocated \$915,000 for scholarships and research into areas as diverse as Multiple Sclerosis, Prostate Cancer, Motor Neurone Disease, Childhood Bullying, Dementia, Parkinson's Disease, Rheumatoid Arthritis, Cardiac Disease, Alzheimer's Disease and Brain Tumours, to name a few.

ARHRF is continuing its focus on mental illness and has committed \$1,039,562 to 21 research projects and a further \$475,000 for 10 projects, specifically to evaluate existing mental health services.

In addition, ARHRF is making substantial contributions aimed at improving health outcomes in indigenous and rural communities through a large number of scholarships.

ARHRF is Rotary's largest national Rotary community service programme and it is the biggest independent health research fund in the country.

Supporting ARHRF enables Rotarians to enhance the health of the Australian community as a whole as well as assisting those who are most in need. Research projects aim to support the development of practical strategies that Rotary Clubs can then apply in their own communities.

Your Club's, or your personal donation to the ARHRF will ensure our continued success.

The **KidsMatter** initiative aims to:

- Improve the mental health and well-being of primary school students
- Reduce mental health problems among students (eg., anxiety, depression and behavioural problems)
- Achieve greater support and assistance for students at risk or experiencing mental health problems.

The school's head of curriculum, Craig Reid, told Rotarians present that three teachers from the school had attended an initial training seminar in Adelaide. After returning, they had completed the training of other teachers at the school, as well as the Parents Support Group.

The initiative has strengthened links between Cooroy Rotary Club and Pomona State School. The formation of an EarlyAct Club within the school is now under consideration.

Kate Del Mar Update:

It is an Easter tradition in Switzerland to paste small flowers and leaves onto egg shells with egg yolk and boil the eggs in natural colours (onion skin makes a nice yellow) for Easter breakfast. And, it goes almost without saying, the day wouldn't be complete without consuming some very good chocolate! The chocolatiers (chocolate shops) have some beautiful examples of their work in their windows this time of year: elaborate ducks, and bunnies with enormous white chocolate teeth. Almost too good to eat (almost...)! The weather has been spectacular over the long weekend. Lots of families gather around café tables outside to enjoy a long lunch under the big blue skies.

I attended the Rotary District 1990 General Assembly in Geneva last Saturday. It was a half-day event starting with coffee and croissants in the morning, followed by presentations on the annual budget, an interesting talk about the correlations between some of Voltair's work and the aims of Rotary, and ending with a long lunch and classical music concert in the Hotel du Rhone. Like the District 1990 Conference, it was again interesting to see how the event was organised bilingually, with the current District Governor – Franz Gilleron – and the incoming District Governor – Pierre Charlut – interchanging effortlessly between Swiss German and French.



My studies have also been going very well. I achieved the highest score in three of my winter semester exams, and I was invited by one of my professors to begin a PhD in international law in Neuchatel (Switzerland) under his supervision. My class-mates and I also attended a very interesting one-day course run by the International Committee of the Red Cross ("ICRC") last Tuesday at the ICRC Headquarters. The focus of the course was on issues relating to detention of individuals (both in times of armed conflict, and in peacetimes); one of the major tasks undertaken by the ICRC is to visit detainees. The course involved a simulated 'role-play' held in the basement of the ICRC HQ where there is a mock prison. Half of the group of students played detainees, and the other half Red Cross delegates, with the supervisors playing the role of the guards. It felt very real and quite terrifying. It was fantastic to see how the law I have studied plays out in 'mock' real life.

I have also been chosen to represent the University of Geneva in a four-student team in an international 'moot' competition on international criminal law which will be held in Mexico City in August this year. We have to prepare written memorials for both the Prosecution and Defence sides, as we will be randomly assigned to represent both sides at various stages of the oral rounds in Mexico. The facts are based on some of the recent events in Africa and the law Court. The facts are complicated, and lots of very interesting issues are raised. The competition will be run entirely in Spanish, so I have a great opportunity to work in that language as well as the research I will do in French and English.

Two weekends ago, I visited fellow classmate Lisa, who lives in Berne (the capital of Switzerland in the German-speaking part), and who invited a group of us to stay the night in her apartment and learn to cook some traditional Swiss dishes. We made two main dishes for dinner: a "Roesti" (a large potato cake) and "Pizokel" which consists of dumplings cooked with a cabbage and spinach accompaniment: very tasty! We also enjoyed a lavish Swiss Sunday breakfast consisting of fresh homemade bread ("Zopf") with jams, Bircher muesli, yogurt, orange juice and coffee. I have attached a photo from the evening.

- Goodwill and friendship between sponsoring clubs in Australia and New Zealand
- Potential Rotarians from student's family and enduring friendships
- High Rotary profile and good public relations with participating high schools
- Opportunity to instil Rotary ethos and principles in exchange students – potential Rotarians of the future!
- Interaction with delightful young Australian and New Zealand students
- Seeing these young people develop and mature as confident young citizens and ambassadors for their country
- Seeing students adapt as a member of a new family in a new country
- Seeing them taking personal responsibility for many aspects of their lives, including budgeting
- Seeing them develop independence and interdependence with Rotarians and host family
- Knowing that there is little or no disruption to their schooling which is, in fact, enhanced by the exchange.

WHAT IS ANZSE?

The exchange runs between families in Australia and New Zealand. A student in one country is matched with a student from the other country, based on similarities of family background, personality, achievements and interests. each student spends one school term living in the other's home and attending

There is now a unique opportunity within D9600 for your Rotary Club to diversify its investment portfolio through the **Australia - New Zealand Student Exchange (formerly Matched Twin) program**. Because young people represent the future of our community, our country and our planet, Rotary supports a veritable smorgasbord of excellent programs ranging from Earlyact, Interact, Rotaract, RYPEN, RYLA, vocational experiences such as the NYSF, Siemen's Science Experience, Storm the Stage and Youth Exchange to inspire our young people to embrace Rotary principles and encourage them to achieve their potential for a more prosperous and harmonious world. Student exchanges such as YEP and ANZSE contribute to world understanding, peace and friendship through the numerous human interactions they facilitate. these programs also result in per-

sonal growth and character development of students under the positive influence of sponsoring and hosting Rotarians.

WHY ANZSE?

ANZSE has most of the benefits of YEP for both Rotary and students but is not as demanding on host Rotary Clubs because the students are hosted by the twin family, not by Rotarians! Apart from a contribution of \$250 towards the students blazer and program administration, the main, and vital, role of the Rotary Club is to provide Counsellor to encourage, guide and assist the outbound student, the New Zealand student while he/she is in the District, and the host family to ensure that the exchange runs smoothly. The matched students spend six months together, three months in each others country, and develop an enduring friendship during this time.

their school. In 2008 the New Zealand students will live in Australia in School Term 2, and in Term 3 the students from Australia will live in New Zealand. The ANZSE program is available to students aged between 13 1/2 and 16 years on the 1st January 2008 (a Date of Birth between 1 January 1992 and 1 July 1994). Each student is sponsored by a Rotary club and the student's School must agree to support the Exchange. The exchange is only confirmed after a successful match has been made. Unfortunately, up to 30 New Zealand students have missed out on the exchange in recent years because of an imbalance in applicants. It is a wonderful program of service to youth!

HOW TO TAKE PART

All 90 high schools within the Australian part of D9600 have received information on the program and a call for applications. Youth Service directors should visit their local high school and discuss their Clubs involvement with the year 9 Student Co-ordinator and encourage suitable students to apply through the expressions of Interest (EOI) brochure (also available on: www.rotaryanzstudentexchange.com) When the club receives an expression of interest, they should arrange interviews of the student and their family (who must be screened as for YEP as suitable host parents). Interview guidelines are provided.

If the Club agrees to sponsor the student, the student must then fill out a comprehensive full Application form and, after endorsement by the sponsoring Rotary Club, send it to the District Committee who will arrange district interviews and orientation. All Australian and New Zealand Chairs then meet together and students matches are negotiated, after computer generated potential matches are generated.

COSTS

The sponsoring Rotary Club is asked to contribute \$250 towards the cost of a jacket/blazer and administration of the program. All other costs are kept to a minimum and are met by the student's parents (approximately \$3,000).

Since we revamped our District RYLA Seminar, for the past 4 years (including 2007), we all have helped 196 participants (Rylarians) and leaders (past Rylarians) **Uncover their True Potential.**

Keeping you informed ... RDU's final restructure plans underway ... ORDER CHANGEOVER SUPPLIES EARLY!

Rotary Down Under's current restructure process is moving towards finality and we will be very grateful for close co-operation and support from our valued subscribers and client base during the last two months of the current Rotary year.

The first stage of the restructure plan has been completed with the successful establishment of RDU's New Zealand Editorial and Promotion Office in the Manakau office of public relations firm Crabtree Associates Ltd.

The former NZ Vincent Street office in Auckland has been closed and the property sold. All Rotary supplies for the 29 Rotary Districts based on New Zealand and Australia are now sourced from Australia.

The RDU organisation has recently advertised the Supplies business for sale and negotiations are underway with several interested parties.

RDU staff will close trading of RDU Supplies in Parramatta, NSW, for the year on Friday, June 22, to allow the new franchise owners to commence business on July 1 – the first day of the new Rotary year.

We are very mindful of the needs of Rotary clubs and districts at this busy changeover period and will do everything possible to service orders and special requests between now and June 22.

However, we do need all Rotarians, Clubs and Districts to plan early and forward end of Rotary year orders to RDU Supplies as soon as possible.

We guarantee every effort will be made to fill all orders before that handover period commences.

Normal operation and administration of RDU will continue under some difficulty for the month of July as Rotary Down Under House in Hunter Street, Parramatta, NSW, undergoes its first major refit in 14 years.

Our plan is to move Rotary Down Under offices to the third (top) floor and base the magazine offices alongside a quality meeting facility for use of all tenants in the building.

The Australian Rotary Health Research Fund and the Probus Centre South Pacific will share a new office plan on the second floor.

The end result will create an improved work environment for RDU's valued staff and major Rotary tenants – and allow for even more efficient service to our 29 clubs and districts.

of the audited financial statements for the District for the year ended 30th June 2006. John spoke to the financial statements which were incorporated into the resolutions booklet. The resolution was passed unanimously.

Resolution 2/2007 – Disassociation by D9600 with ARCAP

This resolution proposing that D9600 take no further part in the ARCAP (corporate alliance) programme was proposed by DG Michael Gregory and seconded by the Kingaroy RC delegate.

PDG Mike outlined a series of occurrences including a finding by RI that the programme was not operating in accordance with RI policy requirements and that it had failed to regularise its affairs as required by RI.

The resolution drew spirited debate and discussion. Whilst there was very little support for continuing the programme, there was a real concern that by distancing the district from the program, the opportunity to oversee its winding up may be lost. A further concern was that a precipitous winding up of the company which operated the programme may bring further bad publicity to Rotary. Ultimately the resolution was passed by a large majority.

Resolution 3/2007 – To amend the Bonne Tenkate Memorial Fund

The purpose of this fund is to provide financial assistance to disadvantaged YEP aspirants. The existing rules did not work well and the existence and purpose of the fund was not well known throughout the district. Proposed by AG Russ Stephenson and strongly supported by the Nambour Club Delegate the resolution proposed amendments to the fund standing procedures to ensure better publicity and more effective operation of the fund in achieving its objectives. The resolution was passed unanimously.

Resolution 4/2007 – Authority for D9600 Incorporation Committee to make minor changes to draft constitution

This resolution (a new motion authorised for consideration by DG Michael) proposed by Reg Collard (RC Toowong) and seconded by PDG John Ker (RC Brisbane High-Rise) sought to authorise the District Incorporation Committee to make minor amendments to the draft district constitution to correct typographic, compliance, consistency or similar issues in the process of finalising the process.

The purpose was to permit the committee to correct some typographical errors already discovered in the draft and also to address any RI or ASIC requirements which arise during the incorporation process. The resolution was passed unanimously.

RI District 9600 Trophies presented at the Kingaroy District Conference

Six D9600 Trophies were presented at the Kingaroy Conference during the DG's Banquet on the Saturday evening.

The Errol Richardson Membership Development Shield is presented to the Club "with the greatest absolute growth in numbers" and/or "the net percentage growth in the event of a tie". Good performances with net increases of 4 members each were the R/C's of

Woombye Sunrise and Aspley, a 5 member increase was recorded by RC Brisbane High-Rise, and both Nambour 76 and Kippa Ring Rotary Clubs attained a net increase of 6. On a percentage win with an increase from 11 to 17, the Rotary Club of Kippa Ring took the Shield.

The District Membership Retention Trophy (previously the Plug the Drain Trophy) was also awarded to the Rotary Club of Kippa Ring with an increase of 54.5% with Woombye Sunrise achieving 21.1%, for this competition for "the greatest percentage growth" in Club Membership.

The Australian Rotary Health Research Fund Perpetual Achievement Trophy is based on support for ARHRF, including the level of per capita club contributions, innovative projects, effective administrative activity and public relations. There was good work by 16 District Clubs but this year the ARHRF award went to the Rotary Club of Maroochydore in recognition of the excellent work done by their Member, Dr. Denis Campbell with his efforts with the Bowelscan Project.

The Ben Bennett Trophy is based on support for The Rotary Foundation, including the level of per capita club contributions during the calendar year. Outstanding performers were the Rotary Clubs of Cooroy, Ashgrove/The Gap, Nambour, Noosa Heads Daybreak, Nundah, Toowong, Aspley and the runner-up Club of Kenmore. The clear winner this year was the Rotary Club of Paddington/Red Hill.

The Jim Trotter Memorial Trophy is for "The best display in the Conference House of Friendship" which Chairman Boyd Fay commented that the Trophies and Awards Committee found the standard so high that it was difficult to award. Special commendation was to The Rotary Foundation Display and The Dragons Abreast Display with many other efforts fully appreciated. The winner with their "Computers 4 Kids" presentation was the Rotary Club of Nundah.

The Jack Nicholson Trophy is for Conference attendance and the Host Clubs of Kingaroy, 63% of members, Kingaroy-Taabinga, 56% and Murgon 47% showed the way to us all, but, of course they were not eligible in terms of the rules for this trophy. The Rotary Club of Toowong with 41% was the runner-up and Coolumbereperiang, Albion, Maleny and Bribie Island all achieved in the mid-thirties with special mention of Honiara with 17%. The winner in 2006, and again this year, the Rotary Club of Kippa Ring with 43.8% attendance. Chairman Boyd also reminded all Clubs that the 2nd June is the closing date for the remaining five Trophies and Awards requiring a specific application. These and an additional five awards will be presented at the District Changeover on 30th June. Please refer to page 35 of the District Directory.

A summary of the resolutions and their outcomes is detailed below in the order in which they appear in the resolutions booklet although they were, as a matter of convenience, dealt with in a different order during the session.

Resolution 1/2007 – Adoption of the 2005/06 Financial Accounts

Col's Comments

Good news at last, with a net increase of 19 members during the month of March, from 1860 to 1879. A very definite change in direction of the membership curve! Still 50 members below the year's start figure of 1929, but there are still two months to go and three months yet to be recorded. Alors, allons-y!

For the first nine months of 2007/08, 23 of our clubs have shown a positive growth in net membership, 14 clubs have shown no overall net change, and 32 clubs have had a net membership loss.

On the subject of "net" membership growth, it is important to remember that even to stand still (on paper) one has to move forward. Losses can and do occur through no fault of the club (death, relocation, and other unrelated reasons), and these have to be compensated for before any net growth is recorded. The following clubs, with net nine-month increases of three or more members (I have excluded from this list any whose March return has not yet been received), are to be especially commended:

Caloundra 5 members, 18.5%.
Kawana Waters 4 members, 33.3%.
Indooroopilly 4 members, 22.2%.
Boroko 4 members, 13.8%.
Brisbane 4 members, 6.0%.
Pine Rivers Daybreak 3 members, 20.0%.
Mooloolaba 3 members, 5.9%.

This time, by the closing date of 17 April there were 20 missing (not too bad, there were 26 last month and it is usually in the high twenties), and for this report (see the "No Return" entries in the table opposite) 10 of them are still missing. No "chasing" was done this time round (we've been away for a bit of a holiday), so by and large this is quite a good result.
